About the Course

The main focus of the course is to provide students with the opportunity to serve and learn about the different cultures of Ghana, primarily through confronting and traversing sociolinguistic, economic, political, and geographic borders. Students will immerse in the culture of the Dagaaba by helping the natives of Duori build a community center. The predicted outcome is that students will develop the ability to confront encounters of difference, while gaining an understanding of how a liberal arts education explores critical social issues.



Requirements

Students will collaborate with natives of Duori, Ghana, to build a community center. They will engage in group discussions and make brief presentations of their reflections at the end of each day. Students will keep a daily journal, and complete a reflection paper to be submitted at the end of the course.



Housing

In the Northern part of Ghana, students will share rooms in a hostel. In the Southern part of Ghana, students will share rooms in the Aya Center of International Awareness and Development. (See image above)

Language

English is the official language of Ghana, so no other language knowledge is required. In the Northern part of Ghana, students will be interacting more closely with natives and so will be exposed to different Ghanaian languages. They will have the help of a translator when necessary.



Activities

- In the Northern part of Ghana, students will engage in servicelearning activities through the construction of a community center. Students will also explore the history of Dagaaba culture through both lectures and experiential learning; students will travel to local centers of attraction, such as Mushroom rock, the hippo sanctuary and the slave trade defense wall. On the final day in the Northern part of Ghana, they will partake in a farewell dinner, drumming, and dancing.
- In the South, students will visit various world monuments and parks, such as the Elmina Castle and Kakum Park where they can hike and experience the famous panoramic canopy walk.
